Williams Settlement Certification

- Per Ed Code 60119, districts must certify the "sufficiency" of textbooks within the first eight weeks of school.
- "Sufficiency" is measured by determining that "*each and every pupil, including English learners, has a standardsaligned textbook or instructional materials, or both, in the four core subjects to use in class and take home, regardless of whether or not homework is assigned, but it does not mean two copies of materials.*"
 - English/Language Arts
 - Math
 - History/Social Science
 - Science



Certification, continued

• Expanded to include Health and World Language (for students enrolled) & availability of high school laboratory science equipment, where applicable in Grades 9-12.


Certification for the District
