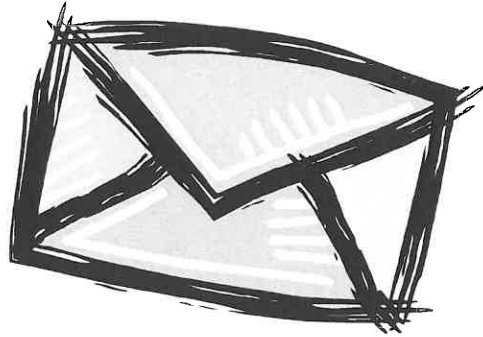
Enclosed is the ballot material for election to CSBA’s Delegate Assembly from your region or subregion. It consists of: 1) the ballot (on red paper) listing the candidates, the reverse side of which contains the names of ALL current members of the Delegate Assembly from your region or subregion; and 2) the required candidate biographical sketch form and, if submitted, a resume. In addition, provided is a copy of the ballot on white paper to include with your board agenda. **Only the ballot on red paper is to be completed and returned to CSBA. It must be postmarked by the U.S. Post Office on or before Tuesday, March 15, 2022.**

Your Board may vote for up to the number of seats to be filled in the region or subregion as indicated on the ballot. For example, if there are three seats up for election, the Board may vote for up to three candidates. However, your Board may cast no more than one vote for any one candidate. The ballot also contains a provision for write-in candidates; their name and district must be clearly printed in the space provided.

The ballot must be signed by the Superintendent or Board Clerk and returned in the enclosed envelope; if the envelope is misplaced, you may use your district’s stationery. Please write **DELEGATE ELECTION** prominently on the envelope along with the region or subregion number on the bottom left corner of the envelope (this number appears at the top of the ballot). If there is a tie vote, a run-off election will be held. Results will be published by May 11, 2022.

All re-elected and newly elected Delegates will serve two-year terms beginning April 1, 2022 – March 31, 2024. The next meeting of the Delegate Assembly takes place on Saturday, May 21 and Sunday, May 22, 2022. Why are you interested in becoming a Delegate? Please describe the skills and experiences you would bring to the Delegate Assembly.

I would be honored to serve as a Delegate to ensure an association, CSBA, reflects and advocates for the diverse needs and interests of all of our school districts and county offices. With my unique background as an educational consultant and curriculum specialist, I bring to the Delegate Assembly not only my recent experience as a board member but also over twenty years of professional experience working with K-12 schools and districts nationwide to improve education services, standards-based curriculum application, and data-driven assessments to inform instructional decisions and promote positive achievement outcomes. I am dedicated to leveraging my unique skill set and experiences to engage with fellow Delegates and collaborate with all involved stakeholders, including parents, community members, fellow board members, and district representatives, to help address the myriad of issues that the Delegate Assembly may advocate for, whether it requires additional resources, recommendations for policies or identification of other strategies to support our fellow board members.

Please describe your activities and involvement on your local board, community, and/or CSBA.

As a school board member, I am actively involved with several district-based committees, including serving on the Tri-Valley Special Education Local Plan Area (SELPA) governance council, the Alameda County School Board Association (ACSBA), the City of Pleasanton Liaison Committee, the City of Pleasanton Economic Vitality Committee, the PUSD Board Curriculum & Instruction Committee, and the PUSD Board Policy Committee. I also serve as an alternate for the Regional Occupational Program (ROP) and the Board Liaison to the PPIE Board (Pleasanton Partnerships in Education Foundation). In addition to my school board responsibilities, I am actively involved as a parent of three children in our school district. I also serve as an adult member of the Youth Commission for the City of Pleasanton, which recently passed an ordinance against vaping in our local community. With this breadth and diversified involvement, I am in touch with the complexity of issues, concerns, and priorities affecting our school communities.

What do you see as the biggest challenge facing governing boards and how can CSBA help address it?

One of the most significant challenges facing our governing boards is the difficulty to help our districts break down systemic barriers for our under-served minority students (i.e., Latinx/African Americans) who continue to lag academically and are disproportionately marginalized denied equal access to various education programs. Instead, these minorities are disproportionately classified into special education programs and are suspended and expelled at a higher rate than other demographic groups. In addition to providing sample equity policies, resources, and access to equity-focused consulting services, all Delegates must work together with CSBA to identify short-term and long-term strategies to help districts and counties make systemic changes to address inequities for their students. For instance, it is essential to examine all district policies to ensure evidence of equity, and examine existing district practices (i.e., such as equitable grading practices), and be thoughtful about the implementation of neutral-based assessments and with the inclusion of culturally diverse curricular resources in all subject areas (not just ELA/social studies, ethnic studies), by integrating other culturally responsive pedagogical resources and strategies that should be available for all of our school communities.
